OVERVIEW AT A GLANCE

Geography

Romania is situated in Southeastern Europe, bordered by the Black Sea to the southeast. It shares land borders with Ukraine to the north, Moldova to the east, Bulgaria to the south, Serbia to the southwest and Hungary to the west.



Climate

Romania has a temperate-continental climate characterized by four distinct seasons. Winters tend to be chilly, particularly in the mountainous areas, whereas summers are generally warm and can reach high temperatures in the plains.

Time Zone

Romania operates on Eastern European Time (UTC+2) and observes daylight saving time. From the last Sunday in March to the last Sunday in October, clocks move forward one hour to Eastern European Summer Time (UTC+3).

Population

Romania has an estimated population of around 19 million people. The population is ethnically diverse, with the majority being Romanian, alongside significant Hungarian, Romani, and Ukrainian minorities.

Language

The official language of Romania is Romanian, a Romance language evolved from Latin. English has also become increasingly popular, especially in higher education, facilitating communication for international visitors.

Flag

The Romanian flag has three vertical stripes: blue, yellow and red. Blue symbolizes liberty, yellow represents prosperity and red signifies bravery, making the flag a powerful emblem of the nation's values and history.



Politics

Romania is a semi-presidential republic with a multi-party system. The President and Parliament share executive powers, promoting democracy and accountability through regular elections.

Security


The Romanian police force is organized nationally under the Ministry of Internal Affairs. It includes a national police force, a national gendarmerie (the military branch of the police), and a border police force.

Emergency

In Romania, the emergency number for the police is 112, which is also the general emergency number for all services, including fire and medical assistance. This number can be dialed in any emergency situation to receive prompt help.

Electricity

In Romania, electrical outlets use a 230V supply with a frequency of 50Hz, and Type C and Type F plugs with two round pins. Travelers may need an adapter or voltage converter for devices with different plug types or voltages.



Religion

Romania is mainly Eastern Orthodox Christian, with the Romanian Orthodox Church holding a significant cultural and religious role. Smaller communities of Catholics, Protestants and other religions also enrich to the country's diversity.

Currency

The official currency of Romania is the Romanian Leu (RON). While Romania is a member of the European Union, it has not yet adopted the Euro, meaning that most transactions are primarily conducted in RON.



Food

Romanian cuisine is diverse, with influences from Eastern European, Turkish, and Mediterranean flavors. Meals often include meats like pork, beef, and chicken, fresh vegetables, and dairy products like cheese and sour cream to enhance flavors.

Beverages

Romanian beverages reflect the country's diverse cultural influences, with options ranging from herbal teas to traditional spirits. Popular drinks include țuică, a strong plum brandy, and palincă, a similar spirit made from various fruits.

Sports

Oina is Romania's traditional sport, rooted in the country's history and cultural heritage. Although less commonly played today, it remains a symbol of national identity and is celebrated at both local festivals and sport events across the country.

A GLIMPSE INTO CULTURE



Romanian culture is a vibrant and rich blend of Eastern European, Balkan, and Western influences, shaped over centuries by its tumultuous history, diverse traditions, and geographical diversity.

Architecture

Romania's architecture showcases its rich history and varied cultural influences, blending Byzantine, Gothic, and Baroque styles that reflect the nation's evolving heritage in both urban and rural landscapes.

Notable examples include Bran Castle, tied to the Dracula legend, Peleş Castle, a Neo-Renaissance masterpiece nestled in the Carpathians, and Hunedoara's Corvin Castle, a striking Gothic-Renaissance fortress.



Woodworking

Woodworking in Romania is a time-honored craft, blending functionality with artistry. Skilled artisans create intricate designs, carving symbols of unity and protection, reflecting cultural values and traditions passed down through generations.

The wooden gates of Maramureș, engraved with patterns and motifs like the sun and tree of life, are one example. Other handcrafted items, such as traditional furniture and tools, further highlight Romania's rich woodworking heritage.

Pottery

Romanian pottery is another centuries-old craft that blends functionality with artistic beauty. Rooted in local traditions, it produces practical items that also carry symbolic meanings, embodying the essence of Romanian folklore.

In places like Horezu, pottery is famous for its unique designs, often featuring floral and animal motifs. Common pieces include vases, bowls, plates, and pitchers, with each item reflecting the region's traditional craftsmanship.



Embroidery

Embroidery in Romania is a cherished tradition, symbolizing regional identity. Intricate patterns with motifs like flowers, animals, and geometric shapes, are sewn onto garments, reflecting nature, spirituality and community values.

The ie, Romania's traditional embroidered blouse, is a powerful national symbol embodying the country's history and values. Nowadays, Romanians wear it proudly on religious holidays, weddings, cultural festivals and National Day.

Sculpture

Sculpture blends classical and modern influences, reflecting its cultural evolution and themes of history and spirituality. From ancient carvings to contemporary works, it embodies the nation's artistic and historical identity.


Notable examples include Constantin Brâncuși's The Endless Column in Târgu Jiu, symbolizing infinite aspiration, and the Heroes' Cross on Caraiman Peak, both standing as important testaments to Romania's sculptural heritage.



Literature

Romanian literature has a rich tradition, rooted in the country's history and societal changes. It includes poetry, fiction, and drama, often exploring Romanian identity and language, along with themes of social issues and human nature.

Prominent figures include Mihai Eminescu, Romania's national poet and a key Romantic figure, playwright Eugène Ionesco, known for his contributions to the Theater of the Absurd, and novelist Mircea Eliade, who explored spirituality.



Mythology

Romanian folklore is rich with mythical creatures and legends that have shaped the country's culture. One of the most famous of these is the strigoi, the restless spirits of the dead, which inspired the legendary figure of Dracula.

Equally captivating are the Sânzieni, mystical fairies said to bless crops and bring prosperity. Their summer solstice festival, marked by rituals and flower crowns, highlights Romania's deep connection to tradition, nature and magic.

Music

Romanian folk music reflects resilience, with melodies that tell stories of love, nature, and hardship. Traditional instruments like the cobza, pan flute, and violin create soulful tunes, drawing listeners into Romania's rural spirit.

Each region of Romania offers a unique folk sound, from Transylvania's slow rhythms to Moldavia's lively tunes. These melodies preserve local stories, connecting the past and present in Romania's timeless musical tradition.



Dances

Folk dances are integral to Romania's cultural celebrations. The hora, a joyous circle dance, is performed at weddings and festivals, with dancers holding hands and moving in synchronized steps.

The călușari, a ritual male dance traditionally performed to ward off evil spirits, is often done in vibrant costumes and embodies the unity, community, and joy that characterize Romanian social life.



Celebrations

Easter and Christmas are key religious festivals in Romania. During Easter, Romanians paint eggs in vibrant colors and attend midnight church services, while Christmas is marked by festive meals and communal gatherings.

Another important tradition in Romania is Mărțișor, celebrated on March 1st to mark the arrival of spring. During this day, Romanians exchange red and white strings, symbolizing health, prosperity, and the renewal of life.

Cuisine

Popular dishes like sarmale (cabbage rolls stuffed with pork and rice), mici (grilled minced meat rolls) and ciorbă (sour soup) are often served with a side of mămăligă (cornmeal porridge), a staple in Romanian households.

Traditional Romanian holiday dishes include cozonac (sweet bread with nuts and cocoa) for Christmas and Easter. While Easter meals feature lamb with fresh herbs and traditional sides, Christmas feasts are centered around pork.

QUICK FACTS

💡 **European Capital of Culture 2023** - Timișoara was designated as one of the European Capitals of Culture for 2023, highlighting its vibrant arts, music, and cultural scenes that are present today in the city's cultural life.

💡 **First Electrically Lit City in Europe** - Timișoara was the first city in the Habsburg monarchy with street lighting (1760) and the first European city to be lit by electric street lamps in 1884.

💡 **Birthplace of the Romanian Revolution** - In 1989, Timișoara was the first city in Romania where large anti-communist protests broke out, sparking the Romanian Revolution that led to the fall communist regime.

💡 **Home to Romania's First Beer Factory** - Established in 1718, Timișoara's first brewery made it a pioneer in Romania's beer production. The tradition continues, with the city being known for its brewing heritage.

💡 **Multicultural Heritage** - With centuries of Romanian, Hungarian, German, Serbian, and Jewish influences, Timișoara embodies a multicultural spirit. This blend is reflected in its architecture, cuisine, festivals, and the languages spoken by its residents, making it one of Romania's most diverse cities.

💡 **Nicknamed the "Little Vienna" or the "City of Roses"** - due to its architectural style, cultural history, and historical connections to the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

💡 The Hungarian name of the city, **Temesvár**, was first documented as Temeswar in 1315. It denotes a castle (vár) situated on the Timiș River (Temes).

Union Square (Piața Unirii) is Timișoara's historic and vibrant heart, known for its colorful Baroque architecture, iconic churches, and lively cafes. During the warm seasons, the square is filled with tourists and locals enjoying the sun from the terraces.

Timisoara Art Museum showcases a variety of artwork and artifacts from the region. The museum's collection includes works of Romanian and European art, as well as temporary exhibitions of contemporary art. Among the notable exhibits are the paintings of the Romanian artist Nicolae Grigorescu, as well as works by other Romanian artists such as Theodor Aman and Gheorghe Petrascu.

Liberty Square (Piața Libertății) served as the main point for military parades and public gatherings, making it the center of political and social life in historical Timișoara.

At the center of Liberty Square stands a Baroque statue of St. John of Nepomuk (1756), one of the oldest monuments in Timișoara and is a key symbol of the city's spiritual and cultural heritage.

Victory Square (Piața Victoriei) was a key site during the 1989 Romanian Revolution, where mass protests against the communist regime began. The square is now considered a symbol of liberation and resilience. It is often associated with the spirit of Timișoara as the first city to rise against communism, earning it a place in Romanian and European history.




Orthodox Metropolitan Cathedral is known for its Byzantine, Moldavian, and Romanian architectural influences. The cathedral's roof is uniquely covered with colored tiles, arranged in intricate patterns inspired by Romanian folk art. The central structure is topped with 11 towers, the tallest of which reaches a height of 90.5 meters, making it one of the tallest religious buildings in Romania.

Bega Canal is a scenic waterway flowing through Timișoara, lined with beautiful parks, pedestrian promenades, and cycling paths. Originally built in the 18th century as Romania's first navigable canal, today, the canal is a vibrant hub for leisure activities, offering boat rides, kayaking.





Memorial Museum of the 1989 Revolution offers a detailed look into the events that led to the end of Romania's communist regime in 1989. Key exhibits include military and militia uniforms, photographs, personal testimonies, and official documents from the revolution, giving a multifaceted perspective on the experiences and struggles of the revolutionaries.

Theresia Bastion named after the Austrian Empress Maria Theresa, is the largest preserved piece of defensive wall of the Austrian-Hungarian fortress of Timișoara. Today it is used as a passage, but it also houses restaurants, bars, a library and two permanent exhibitions of the National Museum of Banat, as well as the Ethnography department of the Banat Village Museum.

National Museum of Banat is a comprehensive museum focused on the region's archaeology, history, and ethnography. Its collections include ancient artifacts, medieval weaponry, and items from the Banat region's diverse cultural communities. Huniade Castle, the museum's home, is itself a significant historical site, built by John Hunyadi in the 14th century and later renovated by the Habsburgs.

Banat Village Museum (Muzeul Satului Bănățean) is an open-air museum dedicated to showcasing Banat's diverse cultural heritage. Spread across a large green area, it features authentic peasant homes, barns, workshops, and a church, each meticulously relocated and reconstructed to preserve their original charm.

1. *First Semester (Autumn Semester)*: September to mid-February.
2. *Second Semester (Spring Semester)*: mid-February to late June.

Beyond the specialized programs offered by our faculties, WUT also provides complementary disciplines designed to develop transversal skills beyond explicit professional training. These courses, a unique and pioneering initiative in the Romanian educational system, play a crucial role in fostering a more integrated and dynamic academic environment.

These courses encourage interdisciplinary learning, helping students develop essential skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, teamwork, and adaptability. By engaging with subjects beyond their main field of study, students gain a broader perspective, preparing them to navigate complex professional and cultural environments.

WUT's commitment to interdisciplinary education also extends to its international outlook, fostering global competencies and cross-cultural communication. This commitment to adaptability and inclusivity extends to international students, ensuring they receive the resources and opportunities needed to integrate successfully into the academic community.

To meet the needs of its 6% foreign student population, the university has adapted its offer so as to include a Preparatory Romanian Language Programme and 22 bachelor and master programmes taught entirely in a foreign language (English, French or German).

CAMPUS OVERVIEW

The **12 WUT faculties** function both at no. 4 on Vasile Pârvan Boulevard, in the well known main building designed by renowned architect Hans Fackelmann, and in five other buildings in the central area of the city, all with a rich historical tradition and an architecture of undeniable value.

Each faculty at the West University of Timișoara (WUT) is designed with dedicated spaces and specialized resources to support its distinct academic focus. These include modern lecture halls, fully equipped laboratories, creative studios, and research facilities tailored to the specific needs of each discipline. This ensures that students and faculty have access to the tools and environments necessary for hands-on learning, cutting-edge research, and innovative projects.



Other important campus locations:

The “**Eugen Todoran**” **Central University Library** is a scientific and cultural institution of national interest. It provides students with a complex range of books, journals, articles, and electronic publications, in a modern building with well-lit and comfortable reading rooms and with shelf access to collections organized by field of study.

The “**Mansarda**” **Gallery** is situated in the building of the Faculty of Arts and Design and has become one of the well-known exhibition spaces in Timișoara. With an unusual and fascinating architecture, the gallery hosts cultural events, exhibits, conferences, symposia, and workshops that bring together students and celebrated artists.

ExperimentariumTM is the result of a collaboration between WUT and the Polytechnic University of Timișoara, whose aim was to make science more visible, tangible, and accessible. The space hosts interactive experimental stands and equipments that facilitate the discovery of the fascinating world of physics.

Over time, the **Orpheum Hall**, the most representative concert hall of the Faculty of Music and Theatre, has hosted concerts, festivals, and competitions. With outstanding acoustics and rococo decorations, the Orpheum Hall can seat about 80-100 music lovers.

Every UVT student must complete a 4 semesters Sport discipline, in the first 2 years of studies. In this regard, WUT accommodates **sport halls** (on Vasile Pârvan Boulevard and Oituz Street), basketball and football courts and one pool.



Accommodation:

WUT offers its students 4,500 accommodation places in 10 dormitories with modern facilities and an up-to-date infrastructure. The latest dormitory is also the biggest in the country, providing 902 accommodation places.





While the level of support may depend on the length of stay, other factors such as the nature of their role and individual requirements also play a key role in determining the services provided.

International Relations Department

ADMINISTRATIVE GUIDE FOR VISITING INTERNATIONAL STAFF

BEFORE ARRIVAL

Whether you're planning a brief visit or a longer stay in Timișoara, proper preparation is crucial for a smooth experience. This section provides an overview of the essential steps to take before your arrival, such as planning for your personal needs, securing travel documents and arranging accommodation.

Travel Documentation

- Ensure your **passport** is valid (for at least six months beyond your planned stay).
- Check if you need a **visa** to enter Romania.

EU (European Union)/ EEA (European Economic Area)/ Switzerland citizens:

Generally, no visa is required for short stays (up to 90 days). A valid national identity document, passport or other document certifying the identity and recognized by the Romanian state is sufficient.

Non-EU Citizens:

Visa requirements vary based on your nationality. For specific details, consult the Romanian consulate or embassy in your home country. Processing times for applications can differ, so be sure to apply well in advance.

- Book your **travel tickets** early to secure better prices and availability.
- Get a **travel insurance** to cover unexpected situations.



Travel insurance protects you from unforeseen events such as medical emergencies, trip cancellations or lost luggage. Ensure your policy includes health coverage for Romania and meets all applicable visa requirements.

Accommodation Arrangements

Short-Term Rentals (hotels, hostels, airbnb)

Should you be interested in short-term rentals, Timișoara offers a range of hotels/ hostels catering to different budgets and preferences.

- For those seeking comfort and convenience, hotels like *Hotel Timișoara* and *Ibis Timișoara City Center* offer modern amenities and central locations.
- Budget-conscious travelers can opt for hostels such as *Pensiunea La Margo* or *Hostel Costel*, which provide affordable rates and social atmospheres.

Booking platforms: **Booking.com**, **Hotels.com**, **Hostelworld**, **Expedia**, **Trivago**.

Airbnb is also a popular alternative, offering everything from apartments in the city center to cozy homes in quieter neighborhoods.

Many Airbnbs offer essential amenities like Wi-Fi, or kitchen facilities, making them perfect for those seeking a home-like experience.



Private Rentals (apartments, houses)

Also, there is a wide selection of long-term rental properties (*private apartments and houses*), located in areas such as Unirii Square, Victory Square, or neighborhoods like Fabric and Iosefin.

Prices vary by location, size, and amenities, but rentals are generally affordable. Properties often come with basic amenities like Wi-Fi, furnished interiors, and sometimes utilities included.

UPON ARRIVAL

Arriving in a new country can be both exciting and overwhelming. This section is your go-to guide for navigating life in Timișoara, focusing on logistical aspects and basic necessities such as legal documentation, health insurance, housing, banking, and phone services.

Mandatory Documentation

Tax identification number

Who needs it? All foreign citizens who have tax obligations (are employed) in Romania.

Purpose: Required for employment contracts, payroll and tax purposes.

Essential information:

- The processing time is generally 5-10 days. Typically handled by your employer through local tax authorities (institution: *National Agency for Fiscal Administration - ANAF*).
- For more details, contact the International Relations Department (EU/EEA/Swiss citizens) and the Human Resources Department (Non-EU citizens).

Registration certificate

Who needs it? EU/EEA/Swiss citizens staying in Romania for more than 90 days.

Purpose: Required to legally reside, work, access services and fulfill social security obligations.

Essential information:

- The processing time is within a few days.

Residence permit

Who needs it? Non-EU citizens staying in Romania for more than 90 days.

Purpose: Required to legally reside, work, access services and fulfill social security obligations.

Essential information:

- The processing time is generally 30-90 days.

Banking

Having a local bank account is often necessary for managing finances while staying for a long time in Romania.

Popular banks include [Banca Transilvania](#), [ING Bank](#), [BRD Groupe Société Générale](#), [Raiffeisen Bank](#), [UniCredit Bank](#) and [CEC Bank](#).

- Regarding the requirements for opening a bank account, each bank has its own policies.
- Choose a bank with a strong online platform and English support.



Housing

For those planning to stay longer in Timișoara, finalizing your rental contract is an essential step upon arrival.

- A valid rental contract is required for registering your address with the local authorities.
- Ensure the contract includes the landlord's details and property address, as these are necessary for the registration process.

Also, take time to explore your surroundings and identify key amenities, such as shops, transportation and healthcare facilities.



Health insurance

Public health insurance in Romania is mandatory for employees and provides access to state-funded healthcare services.

Private health insurance offers faster access to specialized care and private clinics, with plans tailored to individual needs.

Phone Services

Staying connected is essential and Romania offers reliable and affordable mobile and internet services.

- SIM Cards: Widely available, affordable, and typically activated immediately with ID.
- Internet: Generous data plans and excellent mobile and Wi-Fi speeds across the country.

TRANSPORTATION IN TIMIȘOARA

Transportation in Timișoara is well-developed, offering a variety of options for efficiently navigating the city, along with convenient connections to surrounding areas. This section offers an overview of transportation methods, including public transit, ride-sharing apps, and eco-friendly alternatives.

Public Transportation

The city's public transport system is managed by the Timișoara Transport Company (STPT) and includes trams, buses and trolleybuses.

- Tickets can be purchased at kiosks, through mobile apps (**24pay**) or directly on vehicles via ticket machines.
- The app **Moovit** might come in handy with the directions, stations and lines in the city.

Ridesharing Services

The main ridesharing services operating in the city are **Bolt** and **Uber**, which are both widely used in Timișoara and across Romania.

- Both services can be accessed through their user-friendly apps, which allow passengers to book rides, track drivers in real time, and view the estimated fare before confirming the booking.
- Both Uber and Bolt allow cashless payments via credit/debit cards and mobile wallets like Google Pay and Apple Pay, with Bolt also accepting cash in some locations.

The apps are available in English as well, making them accessible to international users.



Driving

Timișoara boasts a well-maintained road network, making driving relatively easy within the city. However, traffic can be heavy during peak hours, and parking in the city center can be challenging.

Regional and International Connectivity


Timișoara Traian Vuia International Airport (TSR) and Railway Station CFR Timișoara are the main gateways to the city.

- The airport, 13 km from the city center, connects Timișoara to major European destinations and offers amenities like Wi-Fi, dining, and car rentals.

- The railway station provides extensive domestic and international connections, with ticketing, waiting areas, and essential services, ensuring convenient access for travelers.

Timișoara is well-connected by intercity buses to other Romanian cities and neighboring countries. Several bus operators, such as **Autogari**, **FlixBus**, and **Novum Travel**, provide services to destinations like Bucharest, Cluj-Napoca, and Arad, as well as international routes to Serbia, Hungary, and Bulgaria.



Despite all the examples above, Timișoara promotes eco-friendly transportation and sustainable mobility. The vaporetto is a scenic, eco-friendly waterbus service along the Bega River, providing a unique and convenient way to travel through the city while enjoying views of the riverbanks.

The city is also bicycle-friendly, with numerous **VeloTM** rental stations and an expanding network of bike lanes, making cycling a convenient and eco-conscious choice. Additionally, electric scooters from platforms like **Lime** and **Flow** offer a quick and green way to navigate the city.

EXPLORING ROMANIA BEYOND TIMIȘOARA



1. Bran Castle

Known as "Dracula's Castle," this medieval fortress near Brașov is often linked to Bram Stoker's Dracula legend. While its ties to Vlad the Impaler are debated, the castle's Gothic architecture and museum exhibits make it a must-visit.

2. Peleş Castle

Located in Sinaia, this Neo-Renaissance castle was built as a summer residence for Romania's royal family. Surrounded by the Carpathian Mountains, it features intricate woodwork, stained glass windows, and lavish interiors. It's considered one of Europe's most beautiful castles.

3. Transfăgărășan Highway

Dubbed "the world's best road trip" by Top Gear, this winding mountain road stretches through the Făgăraș Mountains. It offers stunning views, thrilling curves, and access to attractions like Bâlea Lake and Poenari Fortress.

4. Danube Delta

A UNESCO Biosphere Reserve, this is Europe's second-largest river delta. It's a paradise for bird watchers and nature lovers, with boat tours that explore its labyrinth of channels, wetlands, and wildlife.

5. Painted Monasteries of Bucovina

These unique monasteries in northeastern Romania are famous for their exterior frescoes depicting biblical scenes. Voroneț Monastery, known as the "Sistine Chapel of the East," is particularly renowned for its vivid blue pigment.



6. Sighișoara City

This UNESCO World Heritage town is a well-preserved medieval citadel. Known as the birthplace of Vlad the Impaler, it features colorful streets, a Clock Tower, and annual medieval festivals.

7. Corvin Castle

Located in Hunedoara, this Gothic-Renaissance castle is one of Europe's largest medieval fortresses. Its dramatic architecture includes drawbridges, towers, and a Great Hall, transporting visitors to the Middle Ages.

8. Retezat National Park

Known for its glacial lakes and rugged peaks, this park in southwestern Romania is a favorite for hikers and nature enthusiasts. It's home to over 300 species of plants and a variety of wildlife, including bears and wolves.

9. Wooden Churches of Maramureș

Built between the 17th and 19th centuries, these churches are known for their tall spires, intricate wood carvings, and vibrant interior frescoes. Iconic sites like Bârsana, Ieud, and Desești showcase the region's deep spiritual heritage and unique cultural identity, offering visitors a glimpse into Maramureș's rich traditions and serene rural landscapes.
